The Akana grant writing team develops grants exclusively for Tribes, Tribal entities, and Native non-profits. As a Native-owned firm, we take great pride in having secured more than \$97M in infrastructure grants in support of Tribal sovereignty and independence projects. We routinely write grants to DOE, EPA, USDA, BIA, USDOT, NOAA, USFWE, HUD, USDA, EDA, and IHS, state agencies, and private foundations. We work hand-in-hand with Tribal staff and decision makers in defining competitive and fundable projects in the following areas:

Experience working with Native communities

As a Native-owned company, we regularly work with Tribal governments, Native communities, and organizations in many states. We work closely with Tribal decision makers, and managers and staff of Tribal departments such as Planning, Natural Resources, Public Works, Environmental, EMS, police, and others. We also work directly with Tribal authorities and entities such as health clinics, economic development corporations, Housing TDHEs, and Tribal utilities. We have helped Tribes conduct community presentations for public engagement and outreach activities that are required for many grants.



Knowledge of Tribal sovereignty, government-to-government relationships, and cultural protocols

Our work includes understanding and writing about Tribal sovereignty for energy, food, economic prosperity, affordable housing, and other projects. We understand the Tribes' government-to-government relationships with the federal government and agencies, and the lack of State jurisdictions on Tribal Reservations and Trust lands.



Funding networks & relationships

We reach out to agency representatives and Tribal liaisons as a normal part of our application preparation such as US EDA representatives, BOR Tribal Liaison, USDA Rural Development, and others. We work directly with, or are members of, various networks including Inatai Foundation, Native American Agricultural Fund, American Indigenous Tourism Association, Native American Fish and Wildlife Society, and many others.

We have a subscription-based grants database and an extensive network of agency contacts and e-mail lists through which we receive up-to-date information on availability of grants and new programs. We have access to various federal departments in DC for enquiries regarding funding status of programs impacting Tribal projects.



STAFF, SKILLS, AND CREDENTIALS

Our grant funding staff are familiar with a wide range of Tribal projects that may be needed for residential, cultural, institutional, industrial, and recreational facilities and supporting infrastructure, various Tribal community plans, and other capital improvement projects. We are familiar with the federal and state agency procedures, report preparation guidelines, and design specifications pertaining to Tribal projects. We understand the issues facing Native American communities, and are well versed in the design, bidding, and regulatory compliance requirements of a variety of public funding sources. We are committed to the effective use of public funds. This comprehensive knowledge base allows us to develop the most accurate Tribal project narratives and budgets for grant applications.

In addition to our grant funding team, our staff includes planners, engineers, architects, scientists, construction experts, and support staff who have worked on many Tribal projects. Our planners have been helping Tribes create a vision for their future development. Our architects, scientists, and engineers have completed studies and designs to implement these visions. And our construction services staff have managed the construction of those designs.

SCOPE OF GRANT WORK

We conduct a comprehensive set of tasks for Tribes, tailored to our clients' needs. We routinely complete the following activities:



Comprehensive research to identify potential grant opportunities that align with Tribe goals, visions, strategic plans, programs, projects, and initiatives.

We conduct the following specific activities:

- + Monitor Notices of Funding Availability (NOFAs), Requests for Proposals (RFPs), Grants.gov and many other notifications of public and private sector resources available to meet high-priority needs of Tribes.
- + Use a subscription-based grants tracking system, have our own in-house grants database, subscribe to many agencies grant notification channels, and have ongoing relationships with agency representatives who provide up-to-date information on current and upcoming grants.
- + Work closely with Tribal Departments to identify initiatives and projects for grant funding.
- + Review the Tribe's planning documents to understand its vision and goals, its projects and priorities.
- + Review the Tribe's data and information on its facilities, economic development, community development, land resources, energy, natural resources, administration, and other Tribal characteristics.
- + Develop a list of Tribe's projects for grant funding activities.
- + Identify currently open grants, those scheduled to be announced soon, and those that are likely to be announced in the future.

When potential grants are identified for a project, they are communicated to the Tribe for review and selection of specific grants to complete.



Work closely with Tribes to develop well-structured and compelling grant proposals.

Once the grants and projects are selected, we work with the Tribe to develop a project description that fits within a funding agency's eligibility requirements. We develop a project narrative to highlight the characteristics that match the grant's purpose and requirements. If multiple grants are needed to fully cover the project budget, it may necessitate phasing the project so that grants can be secured for pre-design, design, and construction tasks.



Compose clear, concise, and persuasive grant narratives that effectively communicate the Tribe's goals, objectives, and impact to potential funders.

The typical full grant submittal is a package of information that includes funding agency forms with the Tribe's project summary information, project and budget narratives, and a variety of attachments depending on the type of grant and agency. We develop clear, concise, and persuasive grant narratives that effectively communicate the Tribe's goals, objectives, and impacts to potential funders.





Develop realistic project budgets.

We rely on Tribe technical staff, prior project work, our in-house technical staff, and professional judgment to develop accurate and realistic project cost estimates. For projects in the very early stages of development, we develop estimated costs that are reasonable and realistic. We include contingencies and price escalations to account for inflation and supply chain pressures which have plagued projects over the last three years.

We include budgets for Tribe staff time, Tribe indirect costs, and other costs requested by the Tribe, as allowed by the grant. We develop budget tables in accordance with the grant requirements in their required format. We work with Tribe staff to review and finalize the budget.



Complete grant applications accurately for submittal by the grant deadline.

We set our workflow to complete the application package by the Tribe's deadlines and provide the required supporting documentation during that process. We coordinate with the Tribe to review the technical and administrative parts in preparation for submittal. Our initial review of grants includes flagging and communicating requirements and potential delay areas to the Tribe right away for action. Formal submittal of grants rests with the Tribe but we assist the Tribe with the grant submittal process, as needed.



Keep records of grant applications, submissions, and outcomes. Provide updates to the Tribe on the status of grant applications and relevant communication with funding agencies.

We retain records of the work materials, documents, written narratives, tables, figures, and other grant submittal material in their archives as a matter of company policy. Our grant assistance process includes providing grant submission documents to the Tribe upon completion. At the Tribe's direction, we may keep in contact with funding agencies to track progress of review and announcement of the award. However, funding agencies communicate awards directly to the Tribe's contact person on the grant application.



Provide Post-Award Support Services.

Once a grant is awarded, we can assist the Tribe with Kick-off meetings, work plan development, and compliance planning. We provide progress reporting to Tribe and agencies, milestone tracking, and communication with funders. We can assist with grant management and closeout. We can provide technical assistance, training, and capacity building support to program staff involved in grant development.



DELIVERABLES

Akana will provide the following deliverables for each grant as a routine part of our services:

Written summaries of grant opportunities and recommendations for pursuit

We prepare an internal template form called a “Grant Summary Form” for all the grants to review for applicability to Spokane Tribe’s projects. This form includes summaries of the most pertinent information for each grant and allows the Tribe and Akana to discuss whether to apply for that grant. We use these forms, and our professional experience, to make recommendations to the Tribe on what grants to apply for.

Completed grant applications ready for Tribal submission

We routinely provide a complete grant application package in draft form to the Tribe for review and comment before submittal. When information must be entered into grant portals, we provide them to the Tribe in Microsoft WORD format for review and comment before they are uploaded to the portal. This includes all narratives, budgets, forms, and other attachments.

Draft resolutions, budgets, and supplemental documents as needed

We use the resolution format that the Tribe uses or provide the required text so the Tribe can draft its Resolution. Similarly budget and other supplemental documents will be provided to the Tribe during grant application preparation for review and comment.

Reports and progress updates for awarded grants

We follow the grant agreement requirements to prepare grant progress reports at the frequencies required in the agreement, if requested by the Tribe. We work with the Tribal departments and other entities to gather the required project information as part of post-award grant administration assistance. Of great importance will be working with the Tribe’s Finance Department to setup grants in the accounting system so that all the financial information that the grants compliance reports need are produced correctly when needed.

Post-award Support, as needed

We can provide post-award support documentation, and training materials or guidance documents for program staff, as needed.



TIMELINE AND FEE STRUCTURE



Timeline

Our services will be provided on a as-needed basis, aligned with grant application deadlines and Tribe priorities. The overall timeline for completion of a grant depends on the projects needing grant funding, and the availability of Tribal staff to provide the needed information. The exact timeline will depend on project detail, grant complexity, and start date relative to grant submittal deadline. The timeline is also set by the grant submission deadline, and finally by when the Tribe provides its approval to Akana to proceed with the grants. Specific timelines will be established per project in Task Orders for Tribe approval.

Fee Structure

The total budget for our work is dependent on how many projects and grants we are assigned. For planning purposes, we propose that the Tribe decide on a Research budget to cover the cost of the project identification and prioritization, and grants research. Once the Tribe selects specific grants for completion, Akana will provide a budget for each one to be approved by the Tribe.

There are options to defray the grant preparation cost over time as grants are awarded. We can discuss these options at your convenience. Our clients have found our services of high value and continued to raise the initial amount repeatedly. An important component of an efficient process of assignments and approvals is to have a Tribal Point of Contact with authority to provide Akana with the necessary information and coordination, and to approve work products and invoices submitted.

Our services are charged on a time-and-expense reimbursement basis, using the staff hourly rates in the Standard Billable Rates presented below. These rates are adjusted annually. Our invoices are issued monthly and contain information on grant projects conducted, hours and budget expended by each member of staff, and time entry notes explaining the activities completed.
